Board Meeting Minutes March 14, 2018



I. Call to Order/Pledge of Allegiance & Safety Announcement

The Eastern San Joaquin Groundwater Authority (GWA) Board meeting was convened by Chair Chuck Winn at 9:40 a.m., on March 14, 2018, at the Robert J. Cabral Agricultural Center, 2101 E. Earhart Ave. Stockton, CA. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, a representative of the San Joaquin County Office of Emergency Services provided the required safety information.

In attendance were Chair Chuck Winn, Vice-Chair Mel Panizza, Directors George Biagi, Jr. (arrived after roll call), Grant Thompson, Stephen Salvatore, Alan Nakanishi, Rich Silverman, Elbert Holman, Russ Thomas, David Fletcher, Mike Henry, Eric Thorburn, Dale Kuil, Alternate Directors Steve Cavallini, and Doug Heberle, and Secretary Kris Balaji.

II. SCHEDULED ITEMS

A. Discussion/Action Items:

1. Approval of Minutes of February 14, 2018

Director Salvatore requested an amendment to the minutes, noting there was no comment nor discussion by the Authority Board surrounding the informational items last month.

Motion: Vice-Chair Panizza moved, and Director Silverman seconded, approval of the February 14, 2018 minutes as amended. The motion was approved by directors; Director Holman abstained.

In addition, Ms. Mary Elizabeth, member of the public, requested the specific detailed references she made at last month's meeting be noted as follows:

- Page 2: The comment she made regarding CalWater's local cost share allocation also included a reference that CalWater and San Joaquin County have an MOU.
- Page 3: When she referenced Calaveras and Stanislaus Counties, she also mentioned the Eastside Groundwater Sustainability Agency (GSA). She added an additional comment that she still questions whether or not the JPA should have been amended to include the Eastside GSA.
- She stated that she had pointed out the article in February's agenda, that the City of Lathrop was studying a basin modification, to be moved to another subbasin.

2. Discussion and Possible Action to Authorize Submittal of a Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP) Initial Notification Form to the Department of Water Resources (DWR).

Ms. Alyson Watson, Executive Vice President at Woodard & Curran, and project manager for GSP development, explained that the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) requires an on-line submittal of an Initial Notification Form for each GSP to DWR, which describes how interested parties can participate in the GSP development and implementation, and identifies a point of contact.

Ms. Elizabeth offered comment referring to Attachment II.A.2. of the agenda packet. She noted that on page 2, Scenario 1 is what the basin is involved in and stated that agencies have developed a coordination agreement. The reference states that "each GSP group must submit a GSP initial notification." She also referred to the JPA, Recital D as it relates to coordination. She stated that she does not think that one GSP Initial Notification is sufficient for the basin. Mr. Paul Wells, Regional Coordinator of DWR, stated his understanding is that one GSP initial notification will be sufficient. He further stated that if the GSAs are in agreement, he is comfortable moving forward with one notification. He offered to meet with Ms. Elizabeth to further discuss if she wished.

Motion: Mr. Heberle moved, and Director Silverman seconded with consideration for further discussion on issue raised by Ms. Elizabeth.

3. Discussion and Possible Action to Apply for DWR Technical Support Services (TSS)

Ms. Watson provided background about the DWR TSS opportunity. The goal of the DWR TSS is to provide education, data, and tools to GSAs as they prepare GSPs. Applications are due in Spring of 2018, are evaluated on continuous basis, and critically over-drafted basins have priority for funding. The types of services offered include installation of monitoring wells and other technical services (second phase). She explained this is not a grant reimbursement program, rather it is for direct services based on needs the applicant submits.

Motion: Director Silverman approved, and Director Kuil seconded. The motion passed with unanimous approval.

4. Discussion and Possible Action to Adopt a New Logo for the Eastern San Joaquin Groundwater Authority

Discussion occurred regarding the adoption of a new logo. Mr. Brandon Nakagawa stated that the original logo of a downward arrow indicated recharge. The revised logo represents extraction and input. Director Silverman stated his preference that the Board use up existing materials before more are printed with new logo. Ms. Elizabeth stated that she would like to see 'ESJ' added above 'GWA' in the logo so that it is clear and more personalized. Director Nakanishi supported this. Director Panizza pointed out that the letterhead was part of the logo, which includes the words Eastern San Joaquin. Therefore, it would not be necessary to add the additional letters to the logo.

Motion: Director Thomas motioned to adopt the new logo as presented, without adding 'ESJ', and Director Panizza seconded. The motion passed with unanimous approval.

5. Presentation by Woodard & Curran on GSP Development Process

a. Project Roadmap and Schedule

Ms. Watson presented a roadmap of meeting topics and schedule, noting that the slideshow orientation will be used throughout the project to show progress. The April meeting will be centered on Physical Setting and Undesirable Results. A project calendar in different formats will also be made available in the future. Discussion commenced on the schedule. Secretary Balaji stated that the schedule shows Directors what to anticipate as far as decisions in months to come. He further emphasized that there is no luxury of schedule slip due to legislative deadline. For this reason, decisions need to be made on time to make progress, and the schedule needs to be followed diligently. Ms. Carolyn Lott, Facilitator, stated that if both the member and alternate member of the Authority board are not able to be present at the GWA meetings, the attending members must make sure to keep their alternate member up to date on what was discussed.

b. Stakeholder Engagement and Outreach Approach

There was a reminder of the discussion from last month's meeting on stakeholder engagement and outreach. Multiple forums are anticipated for the process, including advisory committee and non-GSA stakeholder organizations as well as the general public.

It is anticipated that a Stakeholder Committee will be organized. The Stakeholder Committee is anticipated to be comprised of 15-20 organizational representatives. Several examples were given of the type of organizations that would be included. The role of the Stakeholder Committee is to commit to a charter describing responsibilities, participate in monthly meetings to review GSP components, represent the interests of and report back to their organizations, provide feedback and input through facilitated meeting discussions, and make recommendation for consideration. All decisions will stay within the JPA Board. The

aim is to develop an application for the Stakeholder Committee, send it to the interested parties list, post it on the website, and share it with the Board. The following timeline was suggested: Distribute application in March, gather applications and work with staff to review applicants and develop recommended slate in late April, present to the Board the draft slate and charter in May, and have the first meeting after approval by Board in late May.

Ms. Watson asked for input on the proposed Stakeholder Committee approach. Discussion commenced on the formation of the Stakeholder Committee. It was mentioned that farming committees for Lodi can be extensive, and that they can look at consolidation. Questions arose including: Will a Form 700 be needed? Who will pay for implementation? Ms. Watson responded that the payment will come out of the consultant fee. Form 700 will not be required because it is not a formal advisory committee to the Authority, but rather a stakeholder committee convened to provide a forum for receiving feedback.

Director Henry asked for further information on the public outreach component. Ms. Watson stated that Woodard & Curran is working with Crocker & Crocker on a public outreach approach with several components. The plan is not complete yet, but she provided a general overview. One component is the use of the Stakeholder Committee in public outreach efforts. The website is another component, which includes staff the County is hiring to handle website management and the posting of materials. There is additionally a plan around social media and a series of public meetings to be held approximately quarterly. The anticipated general flow of information is the following: Topics first discussed at the Advisory Committee to test ideas and concepts, which will be taken to the Authority Board for feedback. This information will then be brought to the Stakeholder Committee then tested with stakeholders. After the Authority Board is comfortable with everything, the topics will be ready for public presentations. The idea is to have ideas thoroughly vetted before taking it to the public. A critical path item is the Stakeholder Committee application distribution. Ms. Lott stated that this is a regional level process, reaching into local areas. She stated that as the JPA is progressing in this effort, the GSAs should be working in some sort of a parallel process and that part of the consultant contract is to provide member agencies with template materials for that purpose. Ms. Watson further elaborated that another component of outreach will be to provide monthly PowerPoint slide materials to the GSAs which can be customized as desired.

Alternate Director Ward stated that he would like to discuss coordination with adjoining basins as it will affect how other basins go forward. He also suggested going back and documenting outreach activities that have taken place since January 1, 2015 that can be incorporated as an appendix to the GSP. He suggested looking at a table created for the west side of the Delta Mendota basin, which catalogues outreach activities that can be used as a model. He suggested creating and maintaining the log. Ms. Lott suggested that newspaper clippings be included. Mr. Nakagawa, addressing inter-basin coordination, stated that the lines of communication are wide open and that there is interface happening. Sacramento County has reached out to formalize communication with Cosumnes and Eastern San Joaquin. He further stated there is interest in reaching out to Mr. Ward's area to coordinate as well. The County is very involved in the work taking place in the Tracy subbasin. The next step in this process is to formalize the open channels. Chair Winn emphasized that there will be ongoing dialogue, stating the importance of being informed for residents, ratepayers, public, councils, irrigation districts, etc.

Ms. Jane Wagner-Tyack asked for clarification on the Stakeholder Committee slide which contained a reference of agricultural users outside the GSA. Ms. Watson replied that this did not mean "geographically outside the GSA." She gave an example that the Farm Bureau represents agricultural users who may not have direct input into GSA decision making or this JPA. This would provide a way for them to be engaged. Ms. Elizabeth added that she would like to see small community water systems specifically listed as a stakeholder input group. Mr. Paul Wells of DWR indicated that it is spelled out in the legislation, Water Code Section 10723.2, that GSAs shall consider the interests of all beneficial uses and users of groundwater.

Ms. Watson concluded by reiterating that the list shown today was not meant to be a comprehensive list, but illustrative. Ms. Lott summarized by stating that there are three avenues by which interested parties can have input: 1) formal regional group; 2) through their own GSA; and 3) general comment periods.

Mr. Rod Attebery, Authority Counsel, stated that the details of the stakeholder groups are yet to be determined, but reiterated that no formal action will came out of that body and will not have designated meeting times, thereby following Brown Act considerations.

c. Planning Advisory Committee Formation

Ms. Watson presented the proposed approach for the formal advisory committee, stating the recommendation is that a single planning advisory committee be formed that provides input on both policy-related and technical items. This is a different approach than what was discussed in a prior GWA meeting. Proposed planning advisory meetings would be held from 9:00-10:30 a.m., ahead of the Board Meeting which is from 11:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m., and topics will differ from the Board Meeting. All GSAs are recommended to provide a staff member as opposed to a Board Member or Alternate for consideration to the planning advisory committee. Ms. Watson requested that recommendations be emailed to her within the week. She will report back to this Authority Board in April with the outcome of the committee recommendations. Mr. Nakagawa concluded saying the assumption is that the Chair has the authority to appoint the standing committee members and that staff will be working on a recommendation for the Chair.

Director Nakanishi nominated Charlie Swimley for the City of Lodi for the advisory committee. Ms. Lott noted that some entities may have limited staff, but reminded the GWA Board to the extent possible to nominate someone other than a GWA Board member or alternate. We must avoid having a quorum on the advisory committee.

Linda Dorn from the Sacramento County Groundwater Sustainably Agency reached out regarding inter-basin coordination. She stressed the importance of having a representative from Cosumnes Basin included in the advisory committee for inter-basin coordination and suggested that the representative could be a consultant given the technical nature.

No discussion or comments on the information items.

III. <u>Public Comments:</u> Mr. George Hartmann stated that a question came up Tuesday when Ms. Watson visited Central Delta Water Agency. That question was: Why should someone in agriculture who doesn't use groundwater be involved in this process or care about it? Specifically, why should a farmer irrigating with surface water be concerned about the process? Ms. Watson and Mr. Nakagawa responded that this is an individual decision, but that SGMA is not only a groundwater program, it is a water program that looks at all groundwater use and recharge to bring it into balance. SGMA considers surface and groundwater use, but also interdependent streams and ecosystems and water quality. Each GSA has signed up to represent groundwater users in a given area for each of the six "undesirable results" defined by SGMA. Mr. Hartmann asked whether agriculture users should be concerned that there is potential interference with their use of surface water as it relates to SGMA and groundwater usage? Mr. Nakagawa replied yes and added that our

Delta agencies have been working with the GBA and other efforts working on common solutions. We need to have the entire community at the table working on a common solution for the groundwater basin and the future of our community. Mr. Hartmann stated he has raised the matter before, of the potential interference of water rights and that the drafters of SGMA legislation seemed to have overlooked this. There may be an issue in terms of surface water usage. Mr. Hartmann suggested that agriculture users may see this as a reason for becoming more involved in the process.

Ms. Elizabeth stated a need for individual GSAs to provide and publish a basic water budget, explaining how much they are using and where they are getting it from, and that this information should be available for each GSA. In addition, she voiced that the Advisory Water Commission has an environmental representative appointed to the commission who is an attorney that represents some agencies, but does not represent any environmental organization.

Director Biagi expressed interest in being considered, along with other nominees, to participate on the Planning Advisory Committee if it does not present a quorum issue. Director Silverman added that another approach if needed is for GSAs to team up, to jointly nominate a representative.

Director Kuil of the South San Joaquin GSA stated that for their organization, 80% or more is surface water and they pump very little. As the State takes higher inflows, this may increase the need to pump and presents water quality issues. He considers the GWA group as the best way to go. He views the cost of this group as a good investment and the best way to protect our interests.

IV. <u>Directors' Comments:</u>

Director Salvatore gave an update to Lathrop's GSA. The City of Lathrop is seeking a boundary modification and has been working with DWR in the process. The City of Lathrop will send two items to agencies: 1) an explanation and request for discussion if there is interest to do so regarding the boundary modification; and 2) and a template letter of support for a boundary modification. The City of Lathrop is split in two groundwater basins, requiring two GSAs, and the development of two GSPs. Even with the proposed change, the benefits provided by the City of Lathrop toward sustainability would still contribute to the area of this basin. He welcomes any comments.

Mr. Attebery responded to a question regarding Form 700. The Eastern San Joaquin County Groundwater Basin Authority (GBA) and GWA are separate entities, each requiring a Form 700.

No future agenda items were raised.

As directed by California Water Code §10722.2, the California Department of Water Resources ("DWR") developed Basin Boundary Emergency Regulations ("Regulations") to provide local agencies the opportunity to petition DWR to consider a change to existing groundwater basin boundaries. Pursuant to these Regulations, the City of Lathrop ("City") is preparing a request ("Request") to align the boundaries of the Tracy Subbasin (DWR 5-022.15) and the Eastern San Joaquin ("ESJ") Subbasin (DWR 5-022.01) with the City's boundary.

The current basin boundaries split the City between two groundwater basins, requiring two Groundwater Sustainability Agencies ("GSAs") to cover the City, and the development and implementation of two Groundwater Sustainability Plans. The Request will demonstrate that including the entire City within the Tracy Subbasin would allow the City to have a single GSA covering its entire jurisdictional area and promote sustainable groundwater management, which is consistent with the standards by which a jurisdictional modification may be approved by DWR under the Regulations.

On February 8, 2018, the City submitted an initial notification to DWR that it intended to pursue a basin boundary modification for the Tracy and ESJ Subbasins; the City's notice can be found on the DWR website (http://sgma.water.ca.gov/basinmod/init/preview/147). The City plans to discuss the proposed boundary modification at the City Council Meeting on April 9, 2018. Information regarding the Request and upcoming public meetings will be posted on the City's website at http://www.ci.lathrop.ca.us/lathrop/pwd/SustainableGroundwaterManagement.aspx.

The City is interested in receiving any feedback from San Joaquin County about the proposed basin boundary modification. 

Stanislaus County is implementing a Discretionary Well Permitting and Management Program pursuant to its Groundwater Ordinance (Chapter 9.37 of the Stanislaus County Code), adopted in November 2014 to promote sustainable groundwater management.

Pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), Stanislaus County has prepared a Draft Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) for the discretionary well permitting and management program. The Draft PEIR provides program-level analysis of the program across its implementation period through 2042, at which time all groundwater subbasins in Stanislaus County are required under the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) to be operated sustainably. The potential impacts related to the program would primarily occur before Groundwater Sustainability Plans are adopted under the SGMA in 2020 or 2022.

Stanislaus County has issued a Draft PEIR that identifies and describes the environmental issues expected to result from implementing the program. The environmental topics addressed in the Draft PEIR are Agriculture and Forestry Resources, Air Quality, Biological Resources, Cultural Resources, Geology and Soils, Greenhouse Gas Emissions, Hazards and Hazardous Materials, Hydrology and Water Quality, Land Use and Planning, Noise, and Utilities and Service Systems. While the Draft EIR identifies potentially significant adverse impacts to Biological Resources, Cultural Resources, Geology and Soils, Hydrology and Water Quality, Land Use and Planning, and Noise, those impacts would be mitigated to less than significant levels. Other CEQA environmental topics were addressed in the previously issued Notice of Preparation and Initial Study.

Copies of the Draft PEIR are available for review at the Stanislaus County Department of Environmental Resources, 3800 Cornucopia Way, Suite C, Modesto. The Draft PEIR is also available at the Stanislaus County Library, 1500 I Street, Modesto. In addition, the documents may be downloaded from the county's groundwater resources web page at the following internet address: http://www.stancounty.com/er/groundwater/. A public workshop discussing the PEIR will occur at the Stanislaus County Farm Bureau at 1201 L Street in Modesto from 1:30 to 3:00 PM on April 12, 2018.

River Islands will soon start using recycled water

Purple pipe is coming to River Islands.

Earlier this month the Lathrop City Council signed off on a proposal that will allow Woodfield and Curran (formerly RMC Water and Environment) to serve as the program administrator for the city's recycled water program and provide the management services needed to support the first year of the project's implementation.

The \$57,843 cost of hiring the firm will be fully reimbursed by River Islands.

And while the project will initially focus on River Islands, who is funding the initial phases, the work will eventually other newly developed areas of Lathrop as well.

According to the staff report, the program will eventually be expanded to Mossdale, the Central Lathrop Specific Plan area and potentially other areas of development in order to provide the capability of using the city's recycled water for urban landscape uses.

The on-demand delivery would allow River Islands to use the recycled water from the city's wastewater treatment plant to irrigate urban landscaping within the master planned community – saving precious groundwater supplies for residential use rather than applying it to landscaping.

As part of the city's Master Reclamation Permit adopted by the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board, the Recycled Water Program will need additional regulatory monitoring and reporting along with specialized supervisor training to oversee the operation and implementation. The nearly \$58,000 being paid for by River Islands will cover those necessary expenses for the critical first year of the program.

Currently the city disperses a percentage of its wastewater in spray fields along the San Joaquin River to fulfill mandated requirements. It is not uncommon for cities in San Joaquin County to discharge their treated wastewater back out into the San Joaquin River as long as it meets the strict purity standards laid out by the regulatory agencies that monitor the discharges.

The project will allow the city to preserve the crucial drinking water that it gets from ground wells that serve the city – some of which comes from a critically overdrafted basin – and discussion of implementing such a program began during the heavy California drought that caused some wells in the Central Valley to go dry as water tables dropped tremendously from overuse by agricultural and governmental entities.

Some neighboring cities, like Ripon, have proposed monetizing the on-demand deliver of non-potable water to help offset the costs of maintaining the infrastructure necessary to deliver the water to consumers.
